FEBRUARY 27, 2024
"IN CASE YOU MISSED IT"



As we close Black History Month and begin Women's History Month, it's especially poetic that we learned about Harriet Tubman at our Program Meeting on February 27th.



Our speaker was Katie Greene, a notable woman in her own right. In her professional life, Katie has served her community as a Registered **Pediatric** Nurse Practitioner, a Registered Adult Primary Care Nurse Practitioner, an Attorney-at-Law and retired from the USAFR in the rank of Major. She has served on many boards including local Riverside Community Health Foundation, the Riverside Public **Employees** Association, League of Women Voters and the African Riverside American Historical Society. Ms. Greene's motto and life theme is "Learning never ends."

Her inspiring talk about Harriet Tubman began with a bible quote spoken by her to the loved ones gathered at her bedside as she passed at the age of 92 – "I go to prepare a place for you."

Born into slavery, Harriet began her servitude as a 5 year old child whose job was to stay awake and rock the master's baby's cradle throughout the night. If she failed, and the baby cried, she was whipped, and it is said that she layered clothing to cushion the blows. She eventually was

allowed to leave the household to work with her father in the woods.

She enjoyed being outside and took in all that her father taught her about the woods and how to navigate in that environment. This proved to be a valuable asset later in her life.

When she was about 12 years old, she was accidentally struck in the head by a rock intended for a different person.

This injury plagued her with headaches and "sleeping spells" for a number of years. In modern terms she had a traumatic head injury.

At the age of 20, she married a freeman whom she tried to convince to flee the confines of her slavery. He said he would tell the master if she tried. This did not dissuade her passion to be a free woman.

While working near a road one day, a white woman passed by her and whispered, "If you ever need help, knock on my door." Harriet had just met her first person involved in the underground railroad.

Leaving her husband behind, she made her way to Philadelphia, thanks to people like the lady by the road, and found herself helping to escort people to safety and freedom.

She desperately wanted to also free her family from the bondage of slavery, and using the skills she learned working with her father in the woods was able to bring many of her family to freedom.



Despite the 1850 Fugitive Slave Act that allowed the prosecution and death of anyone found to be helping slaves escape, this courageous woman continued her work with the underground railroad to assure others the freedom she now enjoyed. Her nickname in the black community is Moses because of her inspiration and determination to set her people free.

One of the most remarkable qualities of Harriet Tubman was her sense of service and generosity. She was able to parlay her success into a 25 acre plot of land where she built a home for aging slaves.

Harriet Tubman is buried in a military cemetery in Auburn, NY, and exemplifies a life of service. May we all go to prepare a place for others that lessens their burdens.

### YEE HAW!

**HISTORY WALK** 



As the Chair of the History Walk Committee, I feel truly blessed to be surrounded by such engaged and loving Soroptimist sisters. I value everyone's input and thank you for participating in efforts to relocate the Bicentennial History Walk to a downtown Riverside location that is visible and meaningful to residents of the City of Riverside.

After the February Business Meeting, I sent out an email for club members to vote on their first and second choice for the History Walk location. The three choices were in front of the Courthouse, in front of City Hall along Tenth Street and around the patio in front of the Convention Center. Seventeen club members voted (one provided only one choice). What a great percentage of our membership! As you can see from the tally, your vote matters:

First Choice: City Hall (8), Convention Center (5) and Courthouse (4)

Second Choice: City Hall (6), Convention Center (5) and Courthouse (5)

Based on the above vote, President Melanie and I sent the following letter to the Museum Director:

Dear Robyn,

Members of Soroptimist International of Riverside (SIR) appreciate your willingness to work with us regarding the relocation of the Bicentennial History Walk. As you know, SIR members recognize the lasting legacy that the History Walk serves for the City and are desirous of having it placed in a location that is readily accessible to many citizens of our great City.

You had asked President Melanie McKee and me to send you two alternative locations. Our SIR club members have voted and have suggested two locations:

- First Choice: Grassy area in front of City Hall that is along Tenth Street and directly across the street from the SIR Rose Garden at the Court House. See first photo attached.
- Second Choice: In the grass around the patio that is in front of the Convention Center. See second photo attached.

You will note that we are recommending the placement of the granite stones in grass rather than having to dig up existing concrete. We have been in contact with a local monument company and they have suggestions for installation that will provide extra security so that vandals cannot try to dig up the stones. The grass areas are also a great way to reduce the grass footprint in an effort to be water wise for the City.


We appreciate your willingness to support SIR's two suggestions. Please advise the next steps that you recommend.

Robyn Peterson responded to our letter by indicating that both locations were beyond the scope of her authority and that she will discuss the project with the head of General Services. I notified Robyn that we were setting up a meeting with Ward 1 Councilmember Erin Edwards and that meeting will take place on March 4, 2024. Stay tuned for more updates!

# SOROPTIMIST LEADERSHIP TRAINING



### Leadership Tip: Collaborative Leadership

By definition, club leaders lead the direction of their clubs and set the example for where we are headed. Sometimes, it can be easy for leaders to stick with things that made them successful in the past. But, one of the core responsibilities of leadership is to understand when we need to change. We never change for the sake of change. We change when we think change will make us better. stronger and more successful.

Regardless of how creative, smart and savvy a leader may be, she can't transform her club without the brain power and commitment of others. No matter what the issue involves, success dictates that the individuals impacted by change be involved in the change from the very beginning. This is where using a collaborative leadership style comes into play. It's a process in which teams work together toward a common goal. In collaborative leadership, club members work on tasks together, consider problems, while the leader helps the team find the solution.

Some of the benefits of practicing this type of leadership style within your club are engagement, trust leadership succession. and Members become more engaged because they have a higher participation in the club and trust is built simply by the nature of working so closely with others. Also, new leaders emerge more naturally in a collaborative setting. When others are invited to get involved in a committee or a project or share their knowledge, they start getting their feet wet and become more comfortable stepping up in the future.

Finally, we can't overlook one more important element of a collaborative environment. It's FUN! Members value being with other like-minded women and working together to accomplish our mission. Building relationships is important and fun. Friendship is always a top reason why members join and stay Soroptimists.

### Collaborative Leadership in Action

Try the following tips to help you practice collaborative leadership in your club or region:

- Recognize change is accomplished in a team environment, not when one person dictates the process.
- Share information and keep communication lines open.

- Encourage brainstorming because different perspectives can bring about the best possible ideas. Keep in mind, brainstorming is a process and all suggestions should be considered in the early stages.
- Assure everyone in the club has a chance to be heard and positively acknowledge their contributions.
- Promote and model inclusiveness by welcoming new members, making sure they meet others, and include them in discussions.
- Help members make real connections with each other by including teambuilding exercises that encourage trust.
- Solve problems and challenges by actively seeking input from club members.
- Be flexible with rules and responsibilities.
- Address conflicts quickly and fairly by mediation.
- Provide immediate feedback for a job well done or give constructive criticism when necessary.

collaborative Remember. leadership is about creating an inclusive environment where everyone's knowledge creativity are put to good use. Because we live in a diverse and complex world, sometimes especially for Soroptimist clubs, collaborative leadership approach is the best way to meet our goals.

As Soroptimists, we know women and girls face obstacles and discrimination solely because of their gender. One member alone does not have all the knowledge, information and resources necessary to address these issues. However, when we collaborate, we are more effectively able to effect change and make a difference.

Put the above tips in practice and give collaborative leadership a try in your club today!
